## Turkey Increases Official IP Related Fees

ANKARA – Abu-Ghazaleh Intellectual Property (AGIP) would like to inform its clients that the Turkish Patent Institute increased the official fees relating to patents, designs and trademarks as of January 1, 2013. However, AGIP will maintain its charges for filing trademark applications, as for charges for filing industrial design and patent applications, they have been increased.

The increase in official fees will affect the following services:

- Utility model filing; grant; recordal of license, assignment and merger of utility models,
- Utility model annuity payments,



- Industrial design filing, renewal; recordal of license, assignment and merger for industrial designs.

## Libyan Trademark Office to Resume its Operations

TRIPOLI - The Libyan Trademark Office announced that it will resume its activities and full operations beginning May 2013.

According to the Office, any deadlines or priority dates falling between the commencements of the revolution until now will be taken into consideration. The search applications will be received as from April 1, 2013; however, filing new trademark applications will take place starting May 2013.

Meanwhile, Abu-Ghazaleh Intellectual Property (AGIP) would like to urge its clients to send their instructions in order to update its records accordingly.

The documents required for filing a trademark application in Libya are:

- A Power of Attorney; the power of attorney should be signed and notarized by the trademark owner and legalized up to the Libyan Consulate in the applicant home country.
- An extract of the entry of the applicant company

in the Commercial Register (Certificate of Incorporation) legalized up to the Libyan Consulate.

- The Name, address, nationality, and business of the applicant.
- 10 prints of the trademark.
- If priority is to be claimed, a certified copy of the priority document issued from a country member of the Paris Convention should be submitted upon filing with other required documents.

## Hong Kong to have a New Patent System

HONG KONG –The Hong Kong Government has appointed an advisory committee to review the patent system. The key recommendations made by the committee are summarized as follows:

- Establishing an “original grant” patent system with substantive examination of applications,
- Retaining the “short-term” patent system with suitable refinements,
- Regulating the regime on patent agency services.

The Intellectual Property Department of Hong Kong Government has released in February 2013 its initial report related to the patent system in Hong Kong.

The Hong Kong Government and Legislative Council will be responsible to convert the recommendations into law.

## China to Release New Patent Examination Guideline

BEIJING – The State Intellectual Property Office (SIPO) has recently released a revised proposal of the “Patent Examination Guideline” related to the examination process of utility model and design patent applications, in order to enhance the quality of patents in China.

The current version of the Guideline which was put into effect three years ago does not require the

examiner to conduct a patent search to examine the patentability and the novelty, while the proposed Guideline allows the examiner to conduct a novelty search before granting the utility model or design patent.

Since many applications were granted without conducting a patent search, the SIPO proposed such amendments.



# JCD Director General Addresses Expectations and Challenges Facing Jordan Customs

AMMAN - Jordan Customs Department (JCD) Director General Ghaleb Sarayreh lectured on “Jordan Customs and the WTO” at Talal Abu-Ghazaleh Knowledge Forum (TAG-Forum) in which he addressed the expectations and challenges facing the Department and highlighted the achievements made in the past two years.

The lecture, organized by the Policy Development Forum (PDF) and moderated by HE Dr. Mohammad Abu Hammour, was attended by a host of high profile officials in the presence of HE Dr. Talal Abu-Ghazaleh along with representatives of government and non-government entities in the Kingdom.

Sarayreh stressed at the beginning of his lecture on the mission of the Customs Department which seeks to provide distinct custom services that keep pace with rapid global developments, and meet the requirements of comprehensive sustainable development by seeking a balance between customs controls and facilitation of trade, and to continue building the institutional capacities of the customs.

“The Customs’ work has been upgraded in all countries from levying charges and taxes to protecting national economic interests (supporting local industry), and to the protection of society and the environment (from smuggling drugs, weapons and other harmful substances), and then to achieving economic development (trade facilitation), to playing a greater security role against threats to all of supply chain,” he added.

While concerning the challenges facing the Department, Sarayreh said that the Customs is one of the departments that changes tasks constantly due to the nature of the change in international and regional circumstances, and perhaps the most significant of those are the security challenges generated by the waves of international terrorism, which introduced the Customs Department to new regulations that were unknown, such as: Combating smuggling



weapons in all its forms (conventional, chemical dual-use, nuclear among others), combating money laundering and serious cross-border smuggling of people.

Sarayreh stressed that Jordan Customs Department earlier realized that its role is no longer limited to the collection of customs duties, but extends to all aspects of economic and social life in addition to economic and social and national security.

According to Sarayreh, the size of revenues in 2012 amounted to JD 1509.7 million compared to JD1344 million in 2011.

Sarayreh revealed that Jordan’s ranking according to the International competitiveness has advanced to 46 amongst 144 countries up from the 55 ranking amongst 142 countries in 2012 and 2011 respectively.

Sarayreh concluded by saying: “Jordan Customs has become the focus of attention from the customs in the region and beyond and now we host now many delegations of these countries who are interested in getting more from our pioneering experience in the field of technology and other developments. As requested by many customs administrations in these countries, we provided them with a number of our experts, systems and programs to disseminate the Jordanian experience.”



## Lithuania Amends Trademark Law

VILNIUS - After Lithuania's parliament ratified the Singapore Treaty on the Law of Trademarks on November 8, 2012, it also adopted the amendments to Lithuania's Law on Trademarks, which will enter into force on June 1, 2013.

The trademark law amendments and the related amendments to the Law on Fees for the Registration of Industrial Property Objects, which will also enter into force on June 1, 2013, are intended to simplify the procedures and reduce registration fees by approximately 25 percent.

Some of the most important changes to the trademark law are described below.

While currently only well-known trademarks and CTMs with reputation enjoy protection against marks covering dissimilar goods or services, the amended law will extend the protection to international registrations designating Lithuania and national trademarks with a reputation in Lithuania.

To simplify the application procedure, the amended trademark law will allow payment of application fees within a month after the filing. Only details of payment will need to be indicated without providing paper copy of the bank transfer.

In case a mark is contested, the amended trademark law will allow a division of the trademark application or registration into several applications or registrations with the obligation to pay application and/or registration fees for each separate application or registration.

Another novelty is that the assignment of trademark rights will not be permitted if:

- The trademark would become misleading as a consequence of the assignment; or
- If the assignee does not submit proof of permission to use the trademark where such permission is required (use of national symbols for example).



Another important change is that licenses will have effect against third parties even if they are not recorded in the Lithuanian trademark register. In addition, it will no longer be necessary to submit a notarized copy of the license agreement for the recordal of a license. A copy of the license agreement will be sufficient for recordal purposes.

Also included are important amendments pertaining to acquiescence. The amended law is clearer in regard to invalidation actions and avoids difficulties with interpretation of “obviously tolerating the use of a later mark for more than five years” as defined in the current version of the law. The amended law more clearly defines that the trademark may not be invalidated “if the owner of the earlier mark has known and has not opposed the use of a later mark” within five years after its registration.

The provisions on the non-use cancellation actions have also been changed. The amended law no longer includes the provision stating that a trademark will be cancelled if it has not been put to use or if there have not been “serious preparations to start use” for five years since the registration. The amended law simplifies the non-use cancellation grounds, i.e. it simply states that the mark must be brought into genuine use within five years of the registration date.

## Russia Withdraws Reservations to Berne Convention Provisions

MOSCOW - On January 31, 2013, the Russian Federation deposited a notification with the WIPO withdrawing its reservation concerning the Berne Convention for the Protection of Literary and Artistic Works.

The Berne Convention entered into force in Russia in 1995, but Russia expressed reservation regarding Article 18, stating that the treaty would not extend to the works that were already in the public domain in Russia.

This reservation essentially denied the retroactivity of the Berne Convention regarding pre-1973 foreign works, which could not become copyrighted and thus remained in the public domain in Russia. As the intellectual property rights violations were one of the major obstacles to Russia's World Trade Organization (WTO) entry, the WTO accession agreement among other things required Russia to withdraw its reservations to these provisions. The Russian Federation joined the WTO in August 2012.

## Abu-Ghazaleh Announces Launch of TAGIPEDIA, ASREN's First 155 Megabit per Second Dedicated Link, and TAGIUNI

DUBAI - HE Dr. Talal Abu-Ghazaleh, chairman of Talal Abu-Ghazaleh Organization (TAG-Org) delivered a keynote speech at the opening high level roundtable of the Multi-stakeholder Internet Governance in the Arab World meeting in Dubai.

The meeting is hosted by the Telecom Regulatory Authority of UAE, as part of the Arab IGF Open Consultations, and in partnership with RIPE NCC, the Regional Internet Registry for Europe and the Middle East.

In his speech, HE Abu-Ghazaleh urged the Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers (ICANN) to speed up the process of Multi-lingualization of the Internet in order to hedge against fragmentation.

“In my capacity then as Co-chair of the UNICTTF, I organized and chaired the first IGF forum and called on the UN Secretary General to establish an IGF Committee and started the IFG Forum process. My objective then was the “What” more than the “Who” in that process. I urge that we call for focus on what governance rather than by who. I am now involved,

on the part of private sector, in the “Post 2015 Consultations” i.e. after the sunset on the MDGs. ICANN needs to play a role in that future agenda.”

Moreover, and as a member of the WTO panel of experts for shaping the future of trade, Abu-Ghazaleh requested that an “Internet Economy Agreement” be negotiated to facilitate e-commerce and to cater for trade in e-products (knowledge products).

At the same time, he stressed that Intellectual Property Rights (IPRs) protection on the Internet needs to be revisited such that we can see, in the virtual world, disciplines similar to the excellent UDRP system for domain names protection.

Meanwhile, Dr. Abu-Ghazaleh made three significant announcements of pioneering initiatives. “On March 7, 2013 TAG-Org will launch TAGIPEDIA, a Digital Arabic Encyclopedia with half a million authenticated articles – double the free entry articles on WIKIPEDIA! By the end of the year we expect to pass the one million mark making Arabic language content No.6 on the Internet, instead of 24 currently on WIKIPEDIA.”





The second initiative to be implemented by the Arab States Research and Education Network (ASREN), a non-profit, GmbH, formed under the honorary chairmanship of the Secretary General of the League of Arab States (LAS) and chaired by HE Abu-Ghazaleh jointly with the EU, and in collaboration with a number of Arab national research and education networks (NRENs), including UAE, Egypt, Jordan, Morocco, Algeria, Tunis, and Sudan.

“As the world is investing in cross-border 10-100 gigabits per second dedicated links to connect universities, research centers, and hospitals at the regional and international levels, ASREN is to establish a pan-Arab e-Infrastructure dedicated for research and education, provide networking services and applications, support the advancement of inter-Arab research and education, and promote cooperation with the world at large.”

According to HE Abu-Ghazaleh, ASREN will establish its first 155 megabit per second dedicated link, provide EU termination and peering at its router in the UK to Arab NREN international links, facilitate access to world-class scientific resources, and support the development of advanced networks and services across the Arab region. ASREN is also maintaining close relations with the US Internet 2 to help facilitate links and access to variety of advanced US scientific resources and services.

The third initiative is Talal Abu-Ghazaleh University (TAGIUNI.com) that was created to embrace the online revolution with the strong belief that world-class education is a human right and should be available to anyone around the globe.

“This can only be achieved by partnering, rather than competing, with internationally acclaimed universities to bring their knowledge over the cyberspace to those who cannot afford it otherwise. Therefore, TAGIUNI has formed several partnership agreements with world leading universities.”

Students at TAGIUNI choose programs of their interest, register for courses online, sit for exams at TAGI Metric centers and acquire an accredited degree after completing graduation requirements. It is a corporate university supported and sustained by the resources of Talal Abu-Ghazaleh Organization with 80 offices worldwide. Students pay only the listed fees of the university. “At TAGIUNI, we also deliver language learning, vocational and professional qualifications, executive programs and capacity building for the public sector, all in partnership with accredited educational providers,” Abu-Ghazaleh concluded.

TAGIUNI is an innovative university approach to education; a gateway and platform for world-class education, an online delivery system, an e-payment gateway for students, a dedicated computer cloud (TAGCLOUD) environment – yet not any programs of its own!
